

- **5. Offer Value:** Sponsorship is a two-way street. Provide sponsors with opportunities for visibility, recognition, and involvement in chapter activities. Offer various sponsorship tiers for publications; the more they donate, the more publications they receive.

Ask for Feedback: Asking for feedback is not a sign of weakness but a pathway to growth and improvement. Constructive feedback provides invaluable insights, highlighting areas of strength and areas for development. Embracing feedback allows for learning and can help you succeed.

Know Your Speech: You are the only one who knows your event. Have your speech entirely memorized. Don't wait till the week before the National Meeting; after the project review, memorize one line each night till the conference. Record yourself reciting your speech using your phone. This will ensure you are well prepared.

Have Confidence: Confidence comes from being well prepared, which allows you to focus on engaging your audience rather than worrying about what to say next. Your event will run smoothly if you are confident and believe in yourself.

Being diligent with your project and presenting with enthusiasm will bring you one step closer to ending up on stage and in the top ten for your project! What to Pack: National Leadership Conference

The 2024 National Leadership Conference will be held in Seattle, Washington, from June 29 to July 3. It is important to pack with the weather in mind to ensure that you are properly prepared. For the conference, you will wear the FCCLA uniform, including a NJ FCCLA red blazer (supplied by the NJ FCCLA State Office) and business-appropriate attire. This includes black bottoms such as a knee-length skirts, or slacks, with a professional black or white shirt such as an Oxford or blouse. It is crucial to bring all your uniform pieces with you, including any neckwear such as a black or red tie/bow tie, a single strand of pearls, a red, black, or white scarf. Neckwear is not required. Make sure you pack enough uniform clothes for all five days.

Additionally, you should pack a few school-appropriate outfits that you can wear on excursions. Please keep in mind that the temperature is in the mid- 70s, so you might want to pack some jeans or long pants. You should also pack appropriate pajamas that will keep you warm, as during the night, temperatures drop down to the low 50s.

You should also pack any hygiene products that you might need. Don't forget to abide by airport protocols, such as traveling with liquids, so you can easily get through security. The most important thing to pack is your project! You should check with your adviser to see what has to be packed and shipped over to Seattle. Some projects, such as a display boards, will have to be delivered to the hotel. Other projects, such as those that require a portfolio, should be brought with you on the plane.

You should pack any project piece that you are flying with IN YOUR CARRY-ON. This will ensure that your project is safe in the event of lost luggage. Other project parts can include note cards, tape, extra paper, etc.

• Voting Process:

- o Small Chapters:
 - Paper ballots, online voting, or show of hands during a meeting.
 - Have neutral observers count votes for transparency.
- Large Chapters:
 - Secure online voting platform with clear instructions.
 - Ensure confidentiality and fairness in the process.

Announcing Elected Officers:

- o Prompt announcement through meetings, emails, or group chats.
- Consider a special event or ceremony for introducing new officers.

The first term, specific, ensures you clearly identify the exact result you want to achieve. A clear objective should be indicated with the end goal in mind. Next, goals should be measurable and able to be tracked. It is essential that you can monitor your progress to have an accurate understanding of where you are. Consider what indicators or data can be used to assess your progress. The third letter, A, stands for attainable. You want to make your goals challenging, yet probable. It is good to be ambitious, but you must be realistic. Good goals should challenge and motivate you to want to achieve more, while not discouraging you. The fourth term, Relevant, should remind you that your goals should improve your life, improve the lives of FCCLA members, etc. They should add value and help address areas that need improvement in your life. Lastly, the "T" stands for time-bound. Goals should be time-bound and have a clear deadline.

Creating a deadline will motivate you to achieve the goal within the set time. Ask yourself: "When do you want to achieve your goal by?" and "How will you measure your progress?"

One of the most difficult parts of goal-setting can be the implementation of your objectives. However, there are a multitude of measures that can be used to keep yourself on track. Finding an accountability partner can motivate you to accomplish your goals while providing yourself with a support system to achieve them when times are difficult. Choosing an accountability partner that fits your goal needs and can provide feedback with a developed understanding can help you succeed. Additionally, by breaking down your goals into smaller steps, you can ensure you are on target to meet your goals in an easier visual of what needs to be done. Lastly, it is important to keep your goals at the forefront of your mind. Access the plans you have set in a location that is visible to you and write them down.



Convert a T-Shirt into a Cute Quilt of Memories:

Assemble squares from different T-shirts to create a memory-filled patchwork quilt. Sew patches together and batting and backing. Your quilt should be free of creases and loose cloth. Look online for the steps to sew a T-shirt Quilt.











Convert a T-Shirt into Pet Toys:

Making a braided dog toy out of old t-shirts is quick, easy and pets love them! First, cut off the seams and hems of the T-shirt. Then, cut the T-shirt into roughly 12 inches strips and roll the strips into tubes. Finally, tie together three T-shirt strips with an overhand knot and tightly braid the cloth. Tie the ends together with a square knot. To prevent fraying you can hide the T-shirt ends inside the dog toy pushing the ends back into the dog toy with the help of a knitting needle.

Spring and Summer bring a variety of fresh produce to the table, and what better way to utilize all of the goodness than with salads!

Salads typically have a preconceived boring and healthy stereotype to them, but offer a journey through different flavors, textures, and colors. Healthy doesn't always mean bland or tasteless, and infact produce with more color tends to have additional nutritious benefits. So, either as a side or a meal, they can be appetizing and look stunning, while using the very best our state has to offer.

In a delicious salad, there is always a foundation of green, a protein such as grilled chicken or tofu, a fat like cheese or avocado, and a well emulsified dressing to bind it all together.

Our state supplies us with the best blueberries and tomatoes. 
From the comfort of your home, you can combat environmental issues caused by global warming with these impactful tips:

Pasta Salad:

8 oz. farfalle pasta, prepared according to package directions for al dente

1 (1 1/2- to 2 1/2-lb.) whole deli-roasted chicken, skin

removed and meat shredded

1 medium zucchini (about 5 oz.), thinly sliced

2 small yellow squash (about 5 oz.), thinly sliced

2 nectarines, coarsely chopped

1/3 cup coarsely chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

1/4 cup toasted sliced almonds

Lime Vinaigrette:

1 Tbsp. lime zest

2 Tbsp. fresh lime juice

2 Tbsp. white balsamic vinegar

1 Tbsp. Creole mustard


1 1/2 tsp. honey

1 small garlic clove, pressed

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

1/2 tsp. ground black pepper

1/2 cup olive oil



Directions:

- 1. Rinse prepared pasta with cold water and drain well.
- 2. Make Lime vinaigrette: Whisk together lime zest, lime juice, vinegar, Creole mustard, honey, garlic, kosher salt, and freshly ground black pepper in a small bowl. Add olive oil in a slow, steady stream, whisking constantly until smooth.
- 3. Gently stir together pasta, vinaigrette, chicken, next 4 ingredients in a large bowl. Add salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle with almonds and serve immediately.

Make a Sweet Strawberry Treat!

Strawberry icebox cakes are a perfect dessert to make for the Summer! An icebox cake is a dessert with cream and fruits that you leave in the refrigerator before eating! This is a no-bake recipe which only requires five ingredients! Even better, it only takes about 20 minutes to make this strawberry icebox cake.

Strawberry Icebox Cake

Ingredients:

- 2 cups Heavy cream
- 1/2 cup Powdered Sugar
- I teaspoon Vanilla
- I pound Strawberries, rinsed, sliced
- 7.2 ounces Graham Crackers (1.5 sleeves)



Directions:

- I. Prepare a 9x9 pan.
- 2. Slice up the strawberries vertically.
- 3. First, cut the stem of the strawberry off. Slice vertically from the stem to the bottom. Each slice should look somewhat like the image above. Each slice does not have to be perfect!
- 4. Whip the heavy cream. You can either whip the cream with an electric mixer or a whisk. Do so until the heavy cream looks fluffy. It should reach about the consistency as shown above.
- 5. Beat the cream, powdered sugar, and vanilla together. Place the 2 cups of cream, ½ cup of powdered sugar, and I teaspoon of vanilla in either a stand mixer or bowl with a hand-held mixer. Beat these ingredients together until you reach the stiff peak form.
- 6. On a pan, Place a layer of cream to form the base of the cake. Smooth out this layer using a spatula or spoon.
- 7. Place a layer of graham crackers on top of the base layer of cream. Next, add 1/3 (about 2/3 of a cup) of the whipped cream. Smooth out this layer using a spatula or spoon. Then, add a layer of strawberries (about 1/3 of the strawberries). Have the cut portion facing upwards.
- 8. Repeat layering steps two more times. Make sure this ends with the strawberries so that the strawberries are visible on top.
- 9. Wrap with plastic wrap, cover up the pan.
- 10. Refrigerate it for about 4-5 hours minimum.

This recipe surely creates a quick and delicious treat. With barely any ingredients and preparation time, it is definitely a Summer staple! Enjoy!
