






NTRODUCING: LUCAIS ROMO, 2024-2025 FCCLA NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT OF PROGRAMS!

Introducing the 2024-2025 NJ FCCLA State Theme



As chapter officers, it is important to organize chapter meetings to allow members to become more engaged in your chapter-wide initiatives. To help keep chapter meetings efficient and effective, use an agenda! An agenda is essentially an outline of what you plan on covering during your meeting. Below is an example of a meeting agenda:

To make meetings engaging, you must provide a blend of entertainment and information. First, introduce yourself and your council to the attendees, ensuring potential members know to whom they should refer with their questions. After that, icebreakers or entertaining activities should be conducted to foster audience and member engagement! This also allows the chapter to become more united and close to one another. Icebreakers are games that warm up the group and facilitate getting to know others.

Upon completing the beginning portion of your meeting, it is time to discuss the business of what is happening in your chapter. This will increase awareness, involvement, and excitement within your chapter. Be sure to conduct activities where members can voice their opinions on what your chapter is doing. For example, each member can be given two post-it notes to write an idea down and then stick it on the board for everyone to see. It is important that members know that their voices are heard and that their input is valuable to the chapter as a whole! Chapter Office: Steps to Success

Without following up, tasks may remain unfinished or not meet the intended outcome you set while planning them. Your adviser's input will allow you to re-evaluate and make changes to stay aligned with the goals. Following through moves an idea from concept to reality, which helps achieve the desired objectives.

Establishing chapter communication is another vital step toward becoming a successful chapter officer. Checking in with members, working with other officers, and following up with your adviser are all examples of effective chapter communication. Boosting Chapter Engagement with Social Media

Tip 3: Present Opportunities.

Make sure to have opportunities for member participation in your social media posts, as this can help members feel more inclined to interact! For instance, you could set up challenges like meeting five new people from other schools at the Fall Leadership Connection or taking photos with ten red items.

Tip 4: Ask Questions!

A highly effective method to boost engagement is to ask questions. Incorporate straightforward questions into your posts to foster interaction and encourage creativity among members. Additionally, use the "Ask a Question" sticker on Instagram to allow your followers to submit their inquiries.

Tip 5: Connect with FCCLA Platforms

Having an FCCLA chapter in your school district is a pivotal way to gain support and recognition for your school's Family and Consumer Sciences department. One additional way to keep the support of your district's Board of Education (BOE) is to regularly attend BOE meetings to publicize the life, college, and career readiness skills developed in FCS courses.

Each district is unique; however, BOE meetings provide opportunities for public comment from those in the community to add a perspective on a current issue or bring something to the attention of the BOE. This is a significant way to make recurring appearances in your district to advocate for resources and the visibility of your FCS program.

When would you attend these meetings? Review the schedule of your BOE, then work with your adviser, fellow members, and parents from your chapter to organize together. Find a meeting that you can attend as a chapter. Soon, you will be able to find a rhythm in your annual schedule to set a precedent for having an FCCLA member speak at multiple BOE meetings. One example of a time to speak in front of your officials is after a successful conference to deliver a report on your event results and participation.

Always prepare what you have to say beforehand with your adviser. Speak clearly and at an even pace. Understand that you are a powerful representative for your chapter and the Family and Consumer Sciences department. Remember that you are not alone! You can split a statement of a few minutes between several members of your chapter. Express the value of the FCS skills you developed and the monumental leadership development you experienced in FCCLA. Make sure you have a clear point, which could be about financial support or even recognition! Consider creating a leave-behind document for board members with key points and an invitation to a chapter or state event.

Take a deep breath because you hold the power to defend Family and Consumer Sciences in your school. Partner with your adviser to collect your thoughts into one powerful statement with the understanding that you only have a few minutes to get your point across. Keep consistent in your appearances in front of the BOE. This is the next step in your story of becoming a Family and Consumer Sciences and FCCLA advocate!

Next, approach your chapter adviser to ensure that the event you would like to complete has not been chosen by another member. Many chapters utilize a form to list your top three event choices; if your chapter does so, complete this form as soon as possible. Once your event has been chosen, begin working on it by using the event description and rubric to guide your planning. If you need help, remember that you have your chapter adviser and officers as resources. Meet with your chapter adviser weekly (or more!) to create a project schedule and review what you have completed.

Once you have completed your project, start memorizing your oral presentation! Memorizing speeches is a task that requires a lot of time and practice. Once you have it memorized completely, you can focus on other public speaking needs such as eye contact, hand gestures, and voice control.

What are the requirements to vote in New Jersey?

To register, you must....

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be a resident of New Jersey
- Be at least 18 years old by Election Day
- Live in the precinct where you will vote for at least
 30 days prior to the election

What are the ways to vote?

- Vote-By-Mail Ballot: Your vote-by-mail ballot MUST be postmarked on or before 8:00 PM EST on Election Day and be received by your county's Board of Elections on or before the sixth day after the close of the polls. It's a great option for college students who can't make it home for elections.
- In-Person Early Voting: Vote via a voting machine during the in-person early voting period prior to Election Day. General election in-person voting is October 26, 2024 November 3, 2024.
- At Your Polling Place on Election Day: Vote inperson at your polling place on Election Day from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM. The General Election Day is November 5, 2024.

Voting is a right and a responsibility for all citizens. Be sure to make your plan for casting your ballot!

For the Cider Donuts:

2 ½ cups apple cider (600mL) ½ cup light brown sugar (110g)

¼ cup granulated sugar (50g)

2 large eggs room temperature

6 tablespoons unsalted butter melted (85g)

3 ½ cups all-purpose flour (420g)

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

¼ teaspoon ground cardamom

¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg

For the Cinnamon Sugar: (Whisk together and set aside)

1 cup granulated sugar. 200g 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon

Prep Time 2 hours 30 minutes Cook Time 1 hour Servings 18 donuts Calories 223 cal

Equipment: Large Pot, Candy Peanut or vegetable oil for frying thermometer, Wire rack

Instructions

For the Cider Donuts:

- In a small saucepan, bring the cider to a boil over medium-high heat. Boil until reduced to 1 cup, about 45 minutes. Transfer to a heat-proof mixing bowl and cool to room temperature.
- To the cooled cider, whisk in sugars, eggs, and melted butter until well combined.
- In another bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, salt, baking soda, and spices. Pour the cider mixture into the flour mixture and stir together until fully combined.
- Cover dough and chill until firm to the touch, about 2 hours or up to 12 hours.
- Once the dough is chilled, place a wire rack inside a rimmed baking sheet. Fill a Dutch oven with 3-inches of oil. Heat over medium heat to 350 F.
- While oil is heating, scrape the chilled dough out onto a very well-floured surface. Flour the top of the dough and pat to ½-inch thickness. Cut out rounds using a 3-inch donut cutter or a 3-inch round cookie cutter along with a 1-inch cutter to cut holes in the center of each round dipped in flour. (The dough will be very sticky. Don't be afraid to use more flour on your surface if you need it!)
- Working a few at a time, fry donuts in the hot oil until golden brown, about 1 to 2 minutes per side for large donuts and 1 minute for the donut holes. Transfer to the wire rack to drain for a few minutes. Toss warm donuts in the cinnamon sugar. These donuts are best if consumed within a few hours of frying.
